

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Benchnotes - a newsletter of the U. S. Army Cold Regions Research and Engineering Laboratory is now available. It reports progress with ongoing projects to the scientific-engineering community and will provide updates for CRREL bibliographies. The publication is available from the publisher, Hanover, New Hampshire 03755.

Colloquy participants requested information on numbering of CRREL publications. The final numbers in the old series are Technical Report 270, Dec. 1975; Research Report 350, Dec. 1975; and Special Report 245, Dec. 1975.

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The Anchorage Historical and Fine Arts Museum has published Occasional Paper No. 2 -- Biographical Sketches of Authors on Russian American and Alaska, by Henry W. Elliott. This work is a typescript of an original manuscript in the Alaska Historical Library in Juneau. The author is remembered as one of America's first active conservationists; particularly for his work to save the Alaskan fur seal from extinction. Elliott's major work is Our Arctic Province, but his Biographical Sketches reflects his interest and search for information concerning early writers on Alaska. A transcription and a bibliography of Elliott's works or works about him was prepared by John W. Carnahan. Copies are available for purchase from the Museum, 121 Seventh Avenue, Anchorage, Alaska 99501.

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The Scott Polar Research Institute at Cambridge, England, CB2 IER, has recently acquired the papers of the Compania Argentina de Pesca of Buenos Aires, Argentina, the first whaling station in South Georgia, founded in 1904 by the great Norwegian whaling captain Carl Anton Larsen. The company's papers were abandoned on South Georgia and were rapidly deteriorating. They were removed to the Institute with the permission of the Falkland Island government to save them from further decay.

A further major acquisition has been the South Georgia archives, the official administrative papers of this dependency of the Falkland Islands. In order that these papers might be deposited at the Institute, the Keeper of the Public Record Office has recommended to the Lord Chancellor that the Institute be appointed "a place of deposit for public records". Hopefully this newly acquired status may attract to the Institute further polar documents from the public domain in the future.

Photography of the Scott Polar Research Institute library catalogue by G. K. Hall Co. of Boston, Mass. is progressing. It is hoped to complete work on the 19 volumes by the end of the year.

Mr. H. G. R. King, Institute librarian, spent January - March with the Canterbury Museum at Christchurch, New Zealand, advising on the establishment of a new Antarctic library and museum, which will form the major feature of interest in the new centennial extension wing to be opened early in 1977. The visit gave Mr. King opportunities to visit polar collections in Wellington, Auckland and Dunedin and also enabled him to pay calls in a number of Australian centres, notably Melbourne, Adelaide, Canberra and Sydney. Considerable interest was displayed by our southern colleagues in the work of the Northern Libraries Colloquy and we should insure that polar collections in the southern hemisphere are noted in the Directory.

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A Guide to Alaska Newspapers, a joint publication of the Gastineau Channel Centennial Association and Alaska Division of State Libraries and Museums is available on request to libraries with northern collections. Compiled by Phyllis Davis, this guide furnishes information on Alaskan newspapers from the first newspaper in 1868 to current time. Newspapers are listed for 91 communities and locations of libraries having these newspapers. The guide includes an historical overview of Alaskan journalism by Evangeline Atwood, Alaskan author and journalist. Facsimile pages of several early handwritten newspapers are included in the guide. The Alaska Historical Library, Pouch G, Juneau 99811 is interested in locating early Alaska newspapers for microfilming since many files are incomplete.

The photograph collection of the former Alaska Transportation Museum in Anchorage is now located in the Alaska Historical Library. It primarily includes photographs of early aviation in Alaska with some other forms of transportation represented. Several boxes of photographs were transferred to the library, but most photographs lack identification.

Alaska State and Local Publications Received in 1975 is available on request to Colloquy members.

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The Elmer E. Rasmuson Library, University of Alaska, Fairbanks recently purchased some serials and other material that may be of interest for readers, writes Marvin Falk, Arctic Bibliographer.

The largest acquisition has been Russian microfiche backsets. These include items of northern interest within Russia as well as material to support research on Russian America. Two of the more significant purchases are the complete collected laws of the Russian Empire from 1649-1916 and Russkaja Starina. Ezhemesjachnoe istoricheskoe izkanie, vols. 1-176.

The library acquired some journals which report missionary activity in the North. Purchases include Nachrichten aus der Brueder Gemeine, a publication of the Moravians which include reports of missions in Greenland, northern Canada and Bethal, Alaska. These include a majority of the original issues in hard copy for the years 1825-1894. A 19th and early 20th century run of Annales de la Propagation de la foi, Lyon, which carries reports on northern missionary activity carried out by the Society for the Propagation of the Faith has been purchased.

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World Data Center-A, Glaciology is moving from Tacoma, Washington to Boulder Colorado. Beginning October 1976, the Institute of Arctic and Alpine Research (INSTAAR) of the University of Colorado will be responsible for the operation of the World Data Center-A, Glaciology in conjunction with the Environmental Data Service of NOAA, Boulder, Colorado.

INSTAAR requested that the Tacoma office publish <u>Glaciological Notes</u>, No. 64 as the last issue in the accession bulletin format. This issue will be quite voluminous covering materials received by August 1976. To provide multi-subject access to the bibliographical section, the computer has been used to produce the keyword-in-context Subject and Geographical Indexes. For a quick overview of the contributed material, there will be a listing of all principal and co-authors. An inventory of archival materials on microfilm, as well as newly micrfilmed aerial photography of glaciers of the Pacific Northwest and Alaska by Austin Post and Lawrence Mayo will be included.
